In January Mrs Seeds and Mrs Gibson began a journey to become trained as Forest School Leaders. We have amazing spaces around our school, which have been really developed this year, and we wanted support with how to use them to support and extend our curriculum.

The Northern Ireland Forest School Association has put together a training package which we were able to apply for with support from Extended Schools funding. Mrs Seeds and Mrs Gibson attended 6 sessions, on Zoom, with their instructors which introduced the programme and helped them explore the benefits. They also had to complete a number of assignments and projects to be assessed for them to gain their qualification.

When school recommenced at Easter time, they were then able to put all the theory into practice. Our children in Primary 1 and Primary 6 were willing volunteers and have been outside every week building exploring, creating and just having fun! At the beginning of June both Mrs Gibson and Mrs Seeds had to teach a lesson in front of their tutor. Their lessons both got the big thumbs up and helped them complete their qualifications. Primary 6 were also awarded their Nature Ranger qualifications due to their hard work each week.

Becoming scientists with QUB

This coming year sees an exciting project taking place in West Winds Primary School. In partnership with the Royal Society, pupils in West Winds will be exploring the biodiversity of our school alongside scientists and academics from Queen's University, Belfast.

The two-year project, which aims to survey all of the plant and animal life in our school grounds will allow the children explore ways of supporting the biodiversity and how biodiversity can help us solve problems caused by climate change. The children will also work alongside artists to capture what they are learning before exhibiting their work in the Ulster Museum.

Principal, Niall Manague commented 'This exciting, ground-breaking project allows us to fully utilise the amazing outdoor spaces we have and will help us

broaden the horizons and experiences of our pupils as we engage with how protecting biodiversity allows us all to protect against the damage caused by climate change. Our staff team are looking forward to building on the knowledge they already have and we can't wait for our children to experience what it's like to be a reallife scientist!'
